Online apps? SaaS? What on earth are these?

Not sure? Well, don't feel bad. Most people don't. In the cloud? What does that mean? Isn't it funny how this business works? You hear a term for the first time, being used in a conversation or in an article, and it's kind of like it's expected that not only do you know what it

is, but that you've always known. Incredible! "In the cloud" is a metaphor for the Internet. Why don't they just continue saying "Internet"? I don't know. Rutland Region Workforce Investment Board Nancy Burzon, Executive Director Green Jobs - What Does The Industry Look Like?

Everyone is talking about the next wave of job creation and saying it will be driven by the "green economy." Energy efficiency is a top priority for newly inaugurated President Obama, who is calling for the modernizing of federal buildings and increasing the energy efficiency of two million homes—part of the economic stimulus program. Governor Douglas has also put the "green industry" as one

of our economic development priorities for Vermont, feeling it will not only create jobs but is also consistent with the values and culture of Vermonters. So, with that sense of priority, what type of jobs will be created and who will be the winners in the new economy?

I found some predictions in a report entitled **Green Recovery: A Program to Create Good Jobs and Start Building a Low-Carbon Economy**, from the Political Economy Research Institute of the University of Massachusetts. "The recovery program aims to boost private and public investment in six energy-efficiency and renewable-energy strategies:

- * Retrofitting buildings to improve energy efficiency,
- * Expanding mass transit and freight rail,
- * Constructing 'smart' electrical grid transmission systems,
- * Wind power,
- * Solar power,
- * Next generation biofuels.

The related career opportunities include electricians, heating/air-conditioning installers, carpenters, construction equipment operators, roofers, insulation workers, carpenter helpers, industrial truck drivers, construction managers, project managers, energy auditors and building inspectors. In addition, add the accountants and office staff needed to support this volume of work, folks to verify savings, and quality assurance professionals. Also consider that new products will need to be created and manufactured to support the industry.

These jobs certainly look familiar and in fact, they are already in existence. They do require some new areas of knowledge and skill development—staying current with new and evolving technologies. Many of these job categories are already in short supply and we will need to recruit more people into these fields of employment. So here is another area of opportunity— educators will be needed to train people on the new technologies.

Looking at the list, one could conclude that the "green economy" will provide better paying occupations than those of the "service economy" and that is good news for the workforce. For those looking for a new career, take a good look at this list. Training is available locally for many of these "new" careers.



Merchants: Be Alert by James P. Mongeon, State's Attorney Video Cameras & Video Recording The Witness You Need

In an economic downturn property crime often increases. Crimes against businesses are not just about statistics but about the real impact on the business and its employees. A substantial loss of inventory can bring a business down. An armed robbery can have devastating and potentially fatal

consequences.

Below is a reprint of my article from January 2008 because I cannot over emphasize the need for every business to have video cameras **and** video recording.

You have heard the expression "A picture is worth a thousand words". A quality video is worth much more than a picture. A video will document not only the location and identity of a person engaged in criminal activity but it can show the actual commission of the crime. It provides a view of events to the police and a jury. You can provide that type of video evidence by using some simple concepts:

1. Purchase **quality cameras and recording equipment** from a specialty firm that will install the entire system properly. Quality cameras are needed to capture the details of the event as a clear picture. The recorder cannot capture a better image than the camera can view. A quality recorder is essential for proper recording for later viewing.

2. Camera locations should be chosen carefully. Know the subject area you wish to cover. For example, a small store may wish to have one camera focused on the public entry/exit, one on the cashier area, and a third in the area of potential product loss.

3. The recording device should use a **system that is reasonably common**. Unique systems can create problems for police in promptly retrieving valuable evidence. Access to the recorder should be limited to the installer and the store owner (or corporate area manager).

4. Use **quality recording media**. Cheap media can undermine the quality for later viewing despite having quality hardware.


